### **ADAPTIVE REUSE:**


### A BEACON FOR A RESILIENT HERITAGE





Shaped by independence and subsequent legislative changes, India's history has seen various adaptive reuse initiatives. Former rulers' palaces, exempted from wealth tax, were often leased to the government for official use. Instances of adaptive reuse in wartime, industrialization, and post-independence showcase a longstanding tradition of repurposing structures to meet evolving needs.

In the intricate process of adaptive reuse, careful considerations play a pivotal role in preserving the essence and cultural significance of historic buildings. It is imperative that alterations are reversible or have minimal impact, acknowledging the intangible values of age, character, and architectural quality. Respect for the original character remains paramount, even when faced with stylistic or material disparities.

example noteworthy Dharampura Haveli, 135-year-old architectural gem in Delhi, meticulously restored over six years by architect Kapil Agarwal. The Haveli, built in 1880, blends Mughal, Hindu, Jain, and Rajasthani architectural elements, reflecting the rich tapestry of Chandni Chowk's urban fabric. The restoration aimed not only to revive the Haveli's former splendour but also to sustain it for the future.





### STUDY TOUR: GOA (4th July 2023 - 8th July 2023)

The study tour aimed to enrich students of third year B.Arch. with the cultural and historical understanding of Goa to help them excel in the design topic 'A Global fusion center' for their Architectural design studio V.

The students took a tour around Kala Academy, a prominent cultural institution, and learned about the significant role it plays in the promotion and preservation of art and culture in the state of Goa. Fountainhas heritage walk gave the students a deeper understanding of the goan diversity and the heritage involving the unique blend of Indian and Portuguese architecture styles.

The Aguada fort showcased well- preserved Portuguese military architecture, providing insight into Goa's colonial history. Students also took a stroll along the picturesque Parra road, lined with Coconut trees and overlooking fields on both sides.

The final day begun with the tour to the Houses of Goa museum, built by renowned Architect Gerard De Cunha. The students appreciated the splendid collection of houses belonging to the Colonial Era in Goa. The museum itself has a unique ship shape, a blend of Indian and Portuguese Style. Students then visited the 'Mario Gallery', which had a collection of Mario De Miranda's distinctive and humorous illustrations. Mario De Miranda was a renowned Goan artist whose work is still widely celebrated accross goa and the world.

This study tour to Goa was a captivating exploration into the rich cultural heritage and diverse architectural styles that define this coastal paradise. Over the course, students delved into the intricate tapestry of Goan architecture, spanning centuries of history, colonial influences, and local traditions.

### STUDY TOUR: SPITI VALLEY (20th June 2023 - 2nd July 2023)

Amidst the picturesque himalayan landscapes, the students of fourth year B.Arch. set on a journey that unfolded as an architectural odyssey, As a part of their Architectural Design studio VII.

Nestled high in the Himalayan region of Northern India, Spiti valley is often referred to as "The little Tibet" due to its cultural and geographical similarities with Tibet, this valley offers a unique blend of ancient monasteries, and warm-hearted local communities. The students explored the streets of Shimla mall road, studied the architecture, and analysed the settlements around a bustling road.

The journey next, led them to Kalpa a spiritual destination. Kalpa is a small village in the Sutlej River valley, in the Kinnaur district of Himachal Pradesh, where the students got to witness the mighty Kinnaur Kailash peaks. Further walking through the apple fields of the north, the next destination was the Bhimkali Temple at Saharan. A brilliant example of the Kathkuni architecture as it is, students then explored various surrounding temple complexes made with intricate sculpting on wood depicting the robust culture of the settled locals.

Next the students started their journey to Tabo, a small town on the the banks of the Spiti River. The town lies on a road between Rekong Peo and Kaza. The main aim of the visit was to study the refugee settlements, getting a chance to experience a cultural and lifestyle, different from the one back in bustling metropolitan cities. On the way out from Tabo, the students further marched towards the Nako monastery, exploring its intricate patterns.

Enroute the Key monastery, the swarm halted at the great Chicham bridge, Asia's highest suspension bridge. The Key monastery is the largest in the valley and holds a powerful sway. Students explored the irregular prayer chambers interconnected by dark passages, tortuous staircases, and small doors.

Some more destinations of the entire trip included the visit to the Kaza town, the largest township of the valley and the beautiful Chandratal lake that acts as the protected niche of the Spiti valley. This trip offered the students a unique blend of cultural immersion and architectural exploration.

The structure aimed to embody a dialogue between a moving body and space, with a dynamic form focusing on circulation, engaging users to step around in a given space.




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### **DESIGN**


The design of the campus is a combination of traditional vernacular architecture of the contextual region, with contemporary pitched roof. The assymetric roofs coupled with courtyards provide interesting geometric form to structure, while the horizontal brick vernacular elements and internal spaces such as verandas and courtyards climate promote responsiveness.

The project involved identifying cultural factors influence space making, such as notions of privacy territoriality, occupational associations, and preservation of traditional values. These factors were translated into a built form through careful consideration of spatial organization, orientation, and correlation between open, semi-open, and closed spaces.

These heritage sites should be preserved in a proper manner, because if today we allow all these structures to be converted into restaurants, hotels, and other recreational spaces, the future generation will not able to understand the historical importance of these structures, and thier ancient architectural styles will be overshadowed by contemporary ones.

The essence of Adaptive Reuse as a meaningful way to preserve the history and glory is embedded in old forts and palaces. By repurposing these structures, not only do we ensure their conservation, but we also provide an avenue for people to experience and appreciate the rich history they hold. It becomes a dynamic form of storytelling, where the architecture itself becomes a medium for conveying the past while adapting to the needs of the present. This dual Purpose of conservation and promotion through experiential engagement contributes to the cultural and historical tapestry of a region.

The moment a building loses its admirers, it forfeits its identity. Ruins attract only a handful compared to those with purpose. Nalanda University's ruins, once among the largest, now draw only archaeologists and architects for inspiration. Similarly, Bai Harir Vav and other stepwells go unnoticed by many. Conversely, Udaipur Palace thrives as a tourist destination due to its induced purpose.

To convey the history of these structures to the new generation, interaction with the spaces is essential. Without such engagement, the structures may remain unknown and unappreciated until the new generation is compelled to study them through visits or interaction.

The potential for Adaptive Reuse is rooted in its ability to uphold historical contexts and original architectural elements while also accommodating modern requirements. The process of adaptation can indicate how a building has changed throughout time, demonstrating its adaptability and resilience. In the end, adaptive reuse is made possible by careful, context-aware design, which enriches and preserves a building's historical identity.

Rather than causing a loss of past identity, Adaptive Reuse allows buildings to evolve, telling a dynamic story that spans centuries. Architects, recognizing the value of historical narratives, can preserve and celebrate the inherent character of structures, proving that adaptive design can be a bridge connecting the rich heritage of the past with the demands of the present.






